Of course, we can look at this and express dismay at the expectations involved, but who of us hasn't set the wrong expectations for things? So how should we set our expectations?

On the one hand, we can become total cynics and make it clear to everyone that we know that nothing will go right in any case. But is that being a light to the world? On the other hand, we can be the proclaimers of the power of positive thinking. But what about when that doesn't work out? So, how should we handle this as Christians?

However, we also should set another expectation, and that is that this world will ultimately and always disappoint us. God has written on our heart the desire for His ultimate perfection, and that is not something we'll fully enjoy until we stand in His eternal Kingdom.

As we approach Thanksgiving, that's the best place to finish, thanking Him that this Kingdom is ours because of the work of Jesus Christ. In fact, as we not only have Thanksgiving in this month, but also will be ending the Church Year and starting the next Church Year, that's a good reminder as well. We yearn for the End because that Kingdom won for us by Christ will be brought with His return. And in that we will no longer suffer disappointment. We will no longer experience sorrow. 
