Dear Saints of Grace,

As I was thinking about what to write this month, I was reflecting on possible topics and not having anything jump out at me. So, I thought of connections to this time of year—fall, leaves, October, Halloween, etc. Then, for whatever reason my brain turned to pumpkin spice. As you probably see, pumpkin spice has become ubiquitous this time of year. You cannot go to a restaurant, coffee shop, or even many grocery stores without being confronted with pumpkin spice flavored food and drinks. So, then, because I am a nerd, and especially a nerd about theology, I wondered if I could come up with a theological connection to pumpkin spice. Challenge accepted!

To my surprise, it was not all that hard. You see, in searching about pumpkin spice on the internet, I found that someone had done a study on why people enjoy the flavoring so much. The answer: because there are neurological connections which tend to associate the flavor with home. It seems in particular that this blend of tastes and smells tends to remind people of their experiences growing up and with things they find very comfortable and comforting. This brought up a thought to me: why is that a phenomenon? Why are we so attracted to things which are comfortable and comforting, especially with association to home?

Well, I don't think that it's overly complex to understand why we like what is comfortable. There is pleasure in that. It is pleasing to enjoy the things that don't push on us or cause us to be challenged or experience pain and distress. So that doesn't seem all that insightful. But why the attraction to home? In fact, I have found very commonly that those who are forced to move from their homes for whatever reason often are very upset with that. Again, that doesn't seem shocking because of the comfort level we have with being at home, generally. But I think we can see something about our nature in this.

I would argue that this draw is related to how God has created us to yearn for perfect comfort and for the home that is His presence where all distress and pain will be swallowed up. He has written into our hearts a yearning for the perfection that He is and that His Kingdom gives. That is why we are always desiring comfort and peace. That is why we yearn for utopia. God has made us for it. Of course, the reality is that all of the earthly comforts will fall short. This world is fallen and so, as St. Augustine said, our hearts are restless until they find their rest in the Lord. But in His graciousness He has provided that rest in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. He has baptized you into that rest, and feeds it to you in His body and blood. And in all of this promises you the eternal home of His presence where you will know the ultimate comfort of seeing Him face to face. What a glorious hope! Hopefully next time you have pumpkin spice, you'll then be reminded not of your earthly home, but your eternal one with Christ.

Pastor opened our meeting with prayer followed by the reading of the minutes from July and August. Motion made and passed to accept the minutes as written.

Pastor's Report: The youth conference, "Higher Things," was a great experience. Next year's conference will be June 25-28 in Mequon, Wisconsin. All post confirmands are encouraged to attend. There are also several other options for summer youth programs such as Walcamp and Camp Luther. The main topic of conversation at the convention was concerning the Concordia system. Concordia, Texas, desires sole control over the university and even rejected the newly elected regents for the school. Proceedings have now started in the court.

Financial Secretary Report: nothing at this time

Treasurer's Report: Balance on hand as of 8/31/2023, in the checking account was \$123,775.00. This includes the second deposit from the Dave Haffner estate which has been designated to Phase 2 of the parsonage renovation project, mainly the upstairs bathroom. Balance in the Legacy Fund is \$13,984.00 and the Building/Roof Fund of \$86,026.00. The balance in cash for Phase 2/2nd bathroom is \$26,808.65. Two checks were issued in September for parsonage renovation: one being the final payment on bathroom 1 of \$3,682.76 and the second being the deposit on the contract for bathroom 2 of \$7,800.00.

Trustees' Report: The new roof project will start Monday, 9/18/23 and is to last 5 days. MOTION: add to the current roof contract oversize gutters all around the building and new siding to the dormers, all not to exceed \$20,000.00. PASSED

Elder's Report: The acolyte program is now in place. The organ was recently tuned and Lois gives compliments to the company for a wonderful job. \$500.00 was donated to the Maui Relief Fund. Scheduling for Reformation: 5th Sunday with communion; Thanksgiving: Wednesday evening service with Redeemer, Elmhurst; Christmas Eve: matins; Christmas Day: communion. Elders are looking

Walther High School/Grace Christian Academy: no report at this time

Board of Christian Education: Classes started with a good teaching staff and 17 children. Practice for the Christmas Eve program will begin soon.

Budget and Nominating Committees: will be coming up in November.
